







Hello Everyone,

For this edition of the Howler, I wanted to share some thoughts on why sanctuaries are so vital to a "No Kill" community such as Charleston. Many people do not fully understand the difference between a *shelter*, a *rescue*, and a *sanctuary*. Each organization serves a different function, but is equally important to the community, and all three share a common goal!

Open intake shelters, like the Charleston Animal Society, must admit every animal that the county animal control brings in, be it a stray, abandoned, or confiscated from hoarding or abuse cases. They also accept animals surrendered by their owners. CAS does everything they can to get the animals 'vetted' and adopted back into homes as quickly as possible. Rescues may not accept every animal that comes in the door. They might refuse the animals that they feel are unadoptable because of age, behavior, or health issues. Meanwhile, they serve a great purpose in keeping many animals out of crowded shelters and facilitating their adoptions. Both shelters and rescues serve their communities by working tirelessly to spay/neuter the animals that pass through their doors and they save many lives every year.

Sanctuaries are different for many reasons. They are places of refuge that provide long term housing if necessary. While shelters and rescues have smaller enclosures, sanctuary enclosures are usually larger. Many shelters and rescues house animals separately, while sanctuaries allow animals to live with partners or in groups, if possible. Sanctuaries provide homes for animals that can't be adopted from a shelter or rescue because of medical needs, poor socialization, or behavioral issues. Many shy or fearful animals that enter sanctuaries can be rehabilitated. Some negative behaviors can be improved with training, but this takes time and makes the animal's length of stay longer. It also takes more time to find families equipped to take pets with special needs. As a result, sanctuaries do not have as high of an adoption rate as shelters or rescues. Some animals cannot be rehabilitated so that they can be successfully integrated into a family, but instead stay at the sanctuary for life where they are happier and more comfortable.

With shelters, rescues, and sanctuaries working together, the national tragedy of animal overpopulation will be ended, and pets will no longer be killed just because they are homeless!



### **BCCC** visits HHAS!


### (i.e. the Brisish Car Club of Charleston visits Hallie Hill Animal Sanctuary!)

### EASY CROCKPOT DOG FOOD

YIELD: 12 CUPS

PREP TIME: 10 MINUTES

COOK TIME: 6 HOURS TOTAL TIME: 6 HOURS, 10 MINUTES

- 2 1/2 pounds ground beef

- 1 1/2 cups chopped carrots
- 1/2 cup peas, frozen or canned

### **DIRECTIONS:**

Stir in ground beef, brown rice, kidney beans, butternut squash, carrots, peas and 4 cups water into a 6-qt slow cooker.


Cover and cook on low heat for 5-6 hours or high heat for 2-3 hours, stirring as needed.






### Humni Pems!

### July 15th is National Pet Fire Safety Day!



**In the event of a fire,** your pets need protection as much as the rest of your family. The following are some tips to help you prevent fires and know what to do if a fire breaks out in your home.

### Be sure you have working smoke detectors on every level of the home.

Place detectors near bedrooms and in the kitchen, either on the ceiling or 6–12 inches below the ceiling on the wall, well away from air vents.

Be sure detectors are in good working order. Mark your calendar to remind yourself to check the batteries regularly (for example, at the start of a new season).

Another smart home safety measure is to install a carbon monoxide detector in your home. Carbon monoxide is a poisonous gas that can cause severe illness or death to both people and pets.

Have an emergency exit plan that includes your pets, and practice the plan regularly. Once a fire starts, it spreads rapidly, so everyone should know what to do to escape.

- Affix window decals around your home so rescue workers know there are pets inside. Decals can be obtained from your local Bark Busters trainer, the ASPCA or your local fire department.
- Fire experts report that many dogs perish in fires because they are confined in a crate or room and cannot escape. Be sure your fire plan accounts for crated dogs.
- Keep leashes at hand so you can leash your dog to prevent him from escaping in panic.
- Keep pets on a ground floor of your home to make rescue easier.
- Keep hallways and exits free of clutter to allow you to get out of a burning house more safely.

### Make sure pets always wear current identification.

Consider subscribing to a service like I-800-HELP-4-PETS, whose Pet Protector System will help to reunite you and your pet if he becomes lost (www.Help4Pets.com).

**Research a safe place to take your pets.** Ask friends or relatives if they can shelter you and your pets, and check with local pet-boarding facilities, humane societies and animal shelters.

**Assemble a dog disaster kit** with your dog's food and medications, copies of his health records, your veterinarian's phone number and list of facilities you can take your pet, recent photo taken of you with your dog, favorite toy or bedding, and extra leash and collar affixed with the pet's I.D.

**Give a key to a trusted neighbor,** and make sure he knows where the dog might be located within the house so he can inform firefighters.

Ask your local fire department if the fire trucks carry pet oxygen masks. If they don't, ask neighborhood pet owners to join you in making a donation to buy masks for the fire department.

**Listen to your dog!** Canines have a keen sense of smell and can detect smoke long before humans. If your dog is acting strangely, look into the situation promptly and be prepared to gather your family and follow your evacuation plan.

If you must evacuate and can't find your dog in the house, leave an outside door open and then call your dog's name once you get out. He may be able to hear you and escape.

**If your dog was in a smoke-filled building** or if you can smell smoke on his fur, take him to your veterinarian. Toxic fumes can be deadly.

**Prevent fires from happening** by ensuring your dog doesn't have access to dangerous combustible items.

Keep electrical wires and batteries out of your pet's reach.

- · Chewing or biting anything electrical can cause him shock
- · or burns, or could start a fire.
- Don't leave lighted candles unattended. A lit candle
- knocked over by a swinging tail can burn your pet or cause a fire.
