

Goodbye Kaylee! Have a wonderful life! I had to choke back the tears. I can't believe she is gone. Kaylee went home with her new mom and dad today. I am so excited for her. I thought she would never leave Hallie Hill and would have to be here forever. But this is animal rescue. Bittersweet. You must love them enough to let them go.

Kaylee came to Hallie Hill in the summer of 2015. She was a mess. Blind, undernourished and thin as a rail, diabetic, sickly

skin and fur (and more health issues to come later). But what a love she was, even in her deplorable state.

One of the first things we were able to help her with was her sight. Kaylee would stand on her hind legs and reach up to us for love even while she was blind. She knew we were there. Her tail was going 100 miles an hour. She would flash her silly grin and reach for us with all her might. What a sweet, sweet girl. After her surgery, like a miracle, she could see again. Now she wanted to be with us even more.



Then we found her failing to gain weight, and we soon discovered she had a pancreatic issue. Now we would add a special powder to add to her food every meal. Kaylee endures two daily shots to control her diabetes. She is such a trooper!



My job is somewhat routine in the sense of daily duties. Change happens when dogs come and go, each with their own needs and issues. Kaylee was a mainstay for me every day. Making her special food and giving a shot of insulin started my day, every day! Today was the last day for that. Tomorrow everything will be different. I sure enjoyed caring for that darling girl all these years. She was so patient with the shots and so excited to get her food each morning. We had to keep an eye

on her throughout the day because sometimes her blood sugar would crash. Anytime I was near the bunkhouse, I could peek in on her and make sure she was ok. Thankfully, she has been very stable of late and no emergencies have arisen.

I thought Kaylee would stay at Hallie Hill forever, but I am glad I was wrong, for her sake! Now she has new dog and cat friends, but most importantly she has a loving mom and dad. People who know all about her and are still willing to give her a fur-ever home.

But now Kaylee is home. Stan and I have spent this evening looking back at all my photos of her. I have hundreds of Kaylee photos. We love her and know we will miss her, but are certain she has an even better life ahead. What a gift she has been for these past four years! We feel blessed to have had the privilege of caring for her. Thank you, Kaylee for making our life fuller and brighter with your beautiful presence. We know you will have a wonderful life!


Myla

Losing A Dog or Cat Can Be As Hard As Losing A Loved One

Anyone who's ever owned a dog or cat knows that they become more than just a pet — they become a member of the family.



That's why it's so tough when a pet passes away. Whether the animal died suddenly or of an illness, died after a long life or far too young, the loss is painful and can be so difficult to come to terms with.

Some people will heartlessly tell you to just "get over it" or tell you "it's just a dog." Those people don't understand what it's like to lose a pet. They are so much more than just an animal, and getting over it is easier said than done. In fact, it can feel like there's nothing

anyone can say to lessen the pain a pet owner feels after a loss.

The grief we feel about losing a pet is backed up by scientific research. A study has shown that the mourning process that someone goes through after the loss of a pet is very much real.

In fact, it can actually be more difficult to overcome the loss of a pet than it is to overcome the loss of a human.

That may sound crazy to some, but it's only one of the things the study found.

The thing is, we typically bond with our animals in a manner similar to how we bond with humans. As hormones and chemicals are released in our brain when bonding with animals *or* people, we feel connected and loved. So when we spend so much of our time deepening that connection, of course we feel a profound loss.

But why is it harder to get over the death of a pet than the death of a human? Because there's not an "acceptable" way to mourn that loss.

When we lose a human family member or loved one, there are plenty of different resources to help come to terms with that loss. We are often surrounded by other people who also feel the loss, and that shared experience and their kind words can help ease the pain.

From our own Angel's Crossing at Hallie Hill:

In addition to community, we also have options like counseling or therapy to help us through the difficult time — and we aren't criticized for the depth of our emotions.

We just don't have the same support when a pet dies. We're expected to simply move on with our life. We often immediately go back to work, and we're expected to keep outings and events on our calendar in the days surrounding the death. Cancelling plans because your pet died a week ago? A lot of people think that's a poor excuse.

A lot of us may have people in our lives that understand our pain after a pet loss, but they may not realize just how deeply it's affecting us.

And since we have limited resources when dealing with this type of loss, we end up trying to repress our emotions. We never truly come to terms with it or move on in a healthy way. We just bury our feelings.

Psychologist Julie Axelrod says that in addition to losing a loved one, we are also losing a source of comfort and unconditional love. That's huge.

There's a domino effect when losing a pet as well, because it leads to a change in your daily routine. It could actually be more disruptive than the loss of a human in your life. A lot of us must schedule our day around our dogs, to make sure they are let outside, taken for walks, and fed. When they're gone, that loss feels obvious.

We also struggle with feeling like they're there even when they're gone. We just instinctively feel like they're somewhere else in the house or in the backyard. Certain sounds may make us think we hear the whoosh of their tail wagging or their toenails on the kitchen floor.

When we have to make the difficult decision to end a dog's suffering, the loss has an additional edge to it. It is a humane choice, but it doesn't make it any easier to say goodbye. We can struggle with feeling like there's more we could have done, or things we could have done differently for them.

If you've lost a pet, please know that there is nothing wrong about your broken heart. They were your family, and it doesn't matter how anyone else thinks you're supposed to feel. What you are going through is understandable. Even science agrees.

6 Dog-Related Tax Deductions You May be Eligible to Claim

With tax day right around the corner, many of us are searching far and wide for any deductions we can get! That got us wondering, are dogs tax deductible? Well... not exactly, but there are some dog related expenses that may be!



We all know our dogs are members of the family, but the IRS doesn't see them that way – they can't be counted as dependents. But, there ARE some dog-related expenses you might not be aware of! Of course, you'll want to check with your tax professional to make sure your write-offs are legitimate.

1. Moving Your Dog:

According to Kiplinger, If you moved during the tax year, it might be possible to deduct

your moving expenses – including those specifically related to moving your dog. For example, if moving your dog requires special expenses, those expenses are treated no differently (in the federal government's eyes) than any of your personal effects. Making special arrangements to get Fido from your old home to your new one? Save the receipts!



2. Guard Dogs:

According to tax expert, Cliff Ennico as reported in <u>Entrepreneur</u>, guard dogs can be a legitimate write-off. This would include the cost of caring for the dog, but not the dog itself.



And, you can only deduct a percentage based on how much time the dog spends guarding. But, if you've got a guard dog that protects your business and inventory (I wouldn't really try this one as a personal deduction) this could amount to a nice deduction.

3. Charitable Donations to Dog Rescues/Shelters:

It would be easy to assume that the costs of adopting a dog from a registered non-profit, 501(c), would be deductible – the assumption would be wrong. The cost to adopt a dog is not deductible. However, any donations made in excess of regular adoption fees most certainly are. According to the law, only those donations made where no goods or services are received in exchange (i.e., your new dog) can be de-



ducted. Should you choose to make donations to your favorite 501c dog charity, make sure to ask for a letter of receipt that states no goods or services were received. Donations of both goods and services to an approved charity are tax deductible. When donating goods or services to an approved charity, ask for a donation receipt – you'll need it if the value of your donations exceeds \$250. To deduct a charitable contribution, you must file Form 1040 and itemize deductions on Schedule A.

4. Service/Therapy Dogs:



According to <u>IRS Publication 502</u>, You can include in medical expenses the costs of buying, training, and maintaining a guide dog or other service animal to assist a visually-impaired or hearing-impaired person, or a person with other physical disabilities. Just make sure you've got good medical records to back you up, should questions arise.

5. Jobs With Dogs Expenses:

If you own and operate a business with dogs, of course your dog-related business expenses are deductible. If you're a trainer, you may be able to deduct mileage or transporta-

tion costs for visiting clients and their dogs. If you're a dog walker and need to purchase business related items like leashes and poop bags, those expenses can be itemized. As with any job-related expense, just make sure to keep all receipts and be able to prove the items were for job duties, not for your personal pet.

6. Fostering Dogs:



As a result of Van Dusen v. Commissioner, animal rescuers nationwide that are fostering dogs and/or cats for approved charities may claim the expenses during tax time. An approved charity is one that is recognized by the IRS with the 501(c)(3) designation as a Not-for-Profit organization. Fostering expenses eligible for deduction are

food, medicines, veterinary bills, crates, garbage bags, and the like. Even a portion of your utilities can be considered expenses as long as a specific area of your home is only used for the care of the animals and nothing else.

As always, discuss these potential deductions with your tax professional to confirm they are legitimate for your personal financial and tax situation.
