While traveling the winding sandy entrance drive to Hallie Hill, visitors often notice the pavers lovingly arranged at the woods' edge along the front of the property. Our cemetery, Angels Crossing, holds over 168 grave sites of our animals that have passed over the years. Each passing is always honored by staff and volunteers who stop what they are doing to attend a quiet graveside ceremony to pay their final respects.

When I first came to Hallie Hill in 2012, I felt that saying "goodbye" to these cherished pets would test me beyond my limits. As the older dogs and cats slow down and nature takes its course, we spend more time caring for them. As they age, they might require a special diet, medications, or even assistance getting up and down. This special attention and extra time makes our connection with them even stronger, and letting them go even more difficult.

At Hallie Hill, our focus is always on the needs of the animal, so we do what we can to help them through the final stages of their life with respect and love, regardless of our own sorrows. I look to the animals for my own inspiration and strength, as they do not feel sorry for themselves, or fear their own passing. It seems they truly live in the moment, enjoying each meal, each nap in the warm sunshine, and each comforting stroke of their fur.

I remind myself at each burial to rejoice because our loved one is no longer in pain or unhappy, and is free from the restraints of their failing physical body. I comfort myself by remembering that no matter how an animal suffered before arriving at the Sanctuary, they knew respect and love in their time here at Hallie Hill. I'm also comforted by knowing that we have kept the promise we made—they have a forever home as we lay them to rest in our beautiful, peaceful, and sacred Angels Crossing.



Swim Safety: Is Ocean Water Safe for Dogs?

While at the beach, it is important to provide your pooch fresh, clean water to drink. If not, the dog will start to drink water from the sea. This should be avoided because, like in humans, drinking salt water is not safe for dogs. As a matter of fact, it can result in dehydration, vomiting, and diarrhea



The beach may just be *the* ideal spot for your pooch to play, get needed exercise, and bond with other dogs. Nevertheless, keep in mind that vigorous exercise can result in loss of water in the body. Since physical stimulation will cause your dog to become even thirstier, he will most likely need water to drink while playing at the beach. If your dog is not provided with enough fresh water to drink, he might resort to salt water.

The best way to prevent your pooch from drinking salt water is to provide him lots of fresh water to drink while at the beach. Ideally, you need to bring a water bowl that can be refilled continually with fresh clean water. The container should be one that Fido is familiar with, so that he knows where he can find his drinking water. If the use of water bowl is not possible, try carrying a water bottle filled with fresh water.

Then, simply squirt into your dog's mouth the drinking water he needs as often as possible.

Because excessive exercise normally results in dehydration, it is crucial that you give your dog regular breaks while at the beach. It is highly advisable that you take Fido into the shade and offer him lots of water to drink at least every 20 minutes or so – more often if he is particularly active. Bottom line, the beach is a blast for dogs – but the saltwater can be a problem. Just provide plenty of fresh water and keep an eye on your pup to prevent him from taking a sip. And, have fun!





I came across Hallie Hill because my first dog had passed away suddenly and I wanted to start giving back and volunteering my time. I knew I wanted to get another dog in time, but I was afraid I could never love a dog as much as my first one. Almost every Saturday, I would visit Hallie Hill. I looked forward to it every week, and being there with all the animals and the amazing staff really got me through a hard time in my life. After a few weeks had passed, I knew I was ready to search for another dog.

I was open to any type of dog, as long as the dog was active, and wanted to be around people. I remember telling the staff I wanted a 'hyper, needy dog'. (I'm sure that's not something they hear everyday!) I wanted these traits in my next dog, because these were the traits in my first dog that fit my lifestyle so well. Jennifer and I took the tour of all the dogs as I told her about myself and what I was looking for in a dog. We looked at a few, and of course I liked all of them! At the end of our tour, she suggested I look at one more dog. His name was Matthew. He was a 3 year old black lab mix and was a Hallie Hill favorite. He was born at the Animal Sanctuary because his mom had wandered up to the property. The litter had gotten a bacterial infection, but Matthew, and 11 of his 13 littermates survived due to excellent care! Of all of the dogs in the litter, Matthew was the only one left at Hallie Hill! For the life of them, the staff and volunteers at Hallie Hill couldn't figure out why he hadn't been adopted. The day I met him, I waited in the cabin as Jennifer brought Matthew in, and as soon as he walked through the door, he put on the biggest smile! (When he does this, he looks like one of those dogs in the YouTube videos that got caught doing something they shouldn't have!) Jennifer explained that he does this when he is excited. He jumped up on the couch with me and came in for a big hug! I knew then that he was mine.

I was getting ready to move, so I had Matthew stay at Hallie Hill for a month before I could bring him home. I'd visit him there at least once a week. Visiting him was the best part of my week. Finally the day came where I moved into my first home! I rushed the movers out so I could go pick up Matt, I just couldn't wait any longer! Living in a home was very new to him. Imagine teaching a puppy to use the stairs—well now imagine trying to teach a 70lb lab to use them! I can't tell you how many times that first week I had to carry him down those steps because he was too afraid to go down! I wasn't sure if he'd be potty-trained after growing up outside his whole life, but to this day, he has never, and I mean never, gone to the bathroom inside the house. As time grew on, I began to realize that Matthew is everything that I didn't know I wanted in a dog. He was not hyper, he is the most calm dog people have ever met. I will say though, he sure is needy! Every morning it is a challenge to tie my sneakers, because he is constantly trying to lift up my arm so I can pet him!

With a proper introduction, they became the best of friends! Once word of this got around, this hound was adopted in 5 days!


Everyday I ask Matthew how I got so lucky to have found him. Usually for this, he is sitting, and as I begin to talk to him his ears go back, head bowed







What else could you want in a dog? My life at Hallie Hill has been a good life and I have been well cared for, however I desire a long term loving relationship with my own people in our own home, together!



PETS IN SUMMER SERIES HEATSTROKE IN FAMILY PETS

What to do if you suspect heatstroke

- 01** Move your pet thoroughly to the shade parking downwind and to prevent heat body temperature from rising further!
- 02** Ring your vet to tell them you are an emergency - immediate veterinary attention is recommended. Don't take a wait and see approach.
- 03** In the car, keep your air conditioning on or your windows down to keep your pet cool.
- 04** At the vet, treatment for heatstroke may include intravenous fluids, oxygen or a blood test to determine if organ damage has occurred.
- 05** Severe cases can have a significant risk of death and may require hospitalization for 7-14 days.

What symptoms to look for

What to do on a hot day with your pets

- Don't leave your pet in your vehicle, even if it's in the shade.
- Don't travel with your pet in a poorly ventilated vehicle.
- Don't take your dog for a run in the middle of the day.
- Don't allow your pet to exercise excessively.
- Don't forget to provide adequate amounts of fresh water.

What to do on a hot day with your pets

- Don't overhydrate your pet if it's a hot day.
- Keep your pet hydrated.
- Make sure your pet has access to shade at all times.
- If you don't have air conditioning in your car, park in the shade.
- Provide your pet with a bowl of water to cool down.
- Soak your pet in a tub of water to cool down.
- For geriatric pets, make sure you have a plan for emergency care.
- If your pet is showing signs of heatstroke, call your vet immediately.
- Provide your pet with a bowl of water to cool down.

Average body temperature of household pets

DOGS	37.0-39.2°
CATS	37.8-39.2°
BIRDS	38.0-41.0°
RABBITS	38.0-40°
GUINEA PIGS	37.0-38.0°

The closer the temp of the day is to your pet's body temperature, the harder it is for them to keep themselves cool.

Types of pets most susceptible to heatstroke

- Short snout breeds - Pugs, Boxers and Bulldogs.
- Cats with shortened tails like the Persians.
- Dogs that have or have severe problems.
- Pets which are obese or unable to walk under circumstances.
- Dogs that have had heatstroke before could be at a higher risk of getting it again.
- Pets with heart conditions.
- Dogs which exercise excessively in hot weather.
- Pets which are overweight.
- Pets which have recently been relocated to hotter climates.

Why your dog may be more likely to get heatstroke than you

- DOGS CAN'T SWEAT, THERE ARE ONLY EFFECTIVE METHODS OF COOLING BY PANTING.
- YOUR DOG CAN'T ASK FOR A DRINK OR TELL YOU IF THEY ARE TOO HOT.
- DOGS ARE SO SILENT TO PLEASE THEIR OWNERS THEY OFTEN WON'T STOP PLAYING UNTIL THEIR BODIES CAN'T TAKE ANY MORE.

What heatstroke can do to your pet

- Brain damage - In severe cases may be permanent.
- Muscle damage can be severe if heat stroke is untreated with exercise or rest.
- Organ failure - the body temp reaches 43 degrees.
- Death - Liver damage and lung failure.
- Bleeding disorders.
- Lung damage.
- Swelling of the eyes and ears.
- Severe damage of teeth.
- Irritation of the mouth and throat.

Mission Statement

Hallie Hill Animal Sanctuary is a 501c3 that provides sanctuary for dogs and cats with no other home or shelter, rescues and cares for animals in need of assistance for the remainder of their lives, including providing proper shelter, nutrition and medical care.

What we do:

1. Provide respite and rehabilitation for dogs and cats preparing them for adoption, and a loving forever home to those unable to be adopted.
2. Perform community outreach in our area of Hollywood and Ravenel, two of the under served areas of Charleston County.
3. Provide food, medical services, spay/neuter, vaccinations and general wellness care.
4. Provide long-term care and a loving, final home for those animals whose adoption may be difficult due to age, medical or emotional issues.
5. Reinforce the human component of the human/canine/feline relationship in a respectful way by recognizing and honoring the fact that people's love for their animals transcends economic circumstances and cultural differences.
