# The Hallie Hill Howle

We know it is not over, but we are grateful the 2019 hurricane season is drawing closer to its end!

The hurricane preparedness plan at the Sanctuary started months ago, as we cleared out drainage ditches, checked the generator, trees, and much more. What you may not know is that Hallie Hill is equipped to provide for its entire population for over 2 weeks in the event of a natural disaster. Necessarily, our preparedness is extensive and thorough, since it is always our plan to shelter in place. A gravity fed watering system makes it possible to provide water to all the animals with no effort in the event of a power outage. Emergency supplies include everything the animals or the staff may need during or after the storm, from extra insulin to plumbing repair supplies and chainsaw fuel and oil. If a direct hit by a severe storm were predicted, we would call for fosters to assist with evacuation of the more socialized dogs and cats. It is in the best interest of our less socialized animals to remain in their familiar environment, as they would be terribly traumatized and more at risk for escape or injury should they be evacuated.

Overall, Hallie Hill did very well in weathering the effects of Dorian! While we lost many large trees and branches to the high winds, an incredible army of volunteers cleaned up almost everything in just 2 days following the storm! The damaged fences were patched or replaced in less than a week. We are so very grateful for all the volunteers, as well as the donations that came in the aftermath of Dorian! It made a quick recovery possible.

In preparation for future storms, we have been making additional changes such as being thoughtful about the type and location of trees we plant. We have also installed larger gates in select locations to allow easier access by heavy equipment for cleanup after future storms.

In its aftermath, Dorian's silver lining became evident in the incredible outpouring of care and concern shown by our community. The wonderful dogs and cats of Hallie Hill Animal Sanctuary are truly blessed to be so loved!

# 16 Things Shelter Workers And Volunteers Really Wish You Knew! (Part 1/3)

There are a ton of misconceptions that revolve around working or volunteering at a shelter. While it's super fun to snuggle all the pups, it can also be emotional and difficult at times to work with animals in need. Shelter volunteers set the record straight about what they want you to know about the rewarding experience of working at a shelter.

# 1. Adopt, don't shop.

This isn't just our clever catchphrase. Unfortunately, there are thousands of dogs in animal shelters who were abandoned or left to fend for themselves. If every person who was looking for a dog went to a shelter to adopt instead of shopping at a pet store (where a lot of dogs come from puppy mills with horrible conditions) then these numbers would significantly decrease.

# 2. Without a good core of volunteers, a shelter cannot make it.

Shelters are non-profit. This means they are based entirely on donations of both time and money. No shelter can afford to hire full-time staff to care for and walk every single animal, and that is where volunteers step in. Volunteers are able to socialize the animals, spend time with them, walk them, and even help clean their cages or feed them.

# 3. Staff members are just as important as the volunteers!

The few full-time or part-time staff members are just as important as the volunteers! These are truly people with the kindest of hearts. They spend countless hours devoting their time to the animals at the shelter, usually with very little pay. Shelter workers are usually the ones medicating the dogs, cleaning their cages, and doing all the difficult behind-the-scenes stuff.

# 4. Shelter animals are not broken or damaged.

This is one of the worst misconceptions that people have about shelters. The animals that come from shelters were usually thrown out by their owners, sometimes abused, or sometimes lived their lives as a stray. This doesn't mean they aren't great animals! I like to think that all of the hardships that these animals have faced leave them that much more vulnerable to falling in love with a new family or owner. That's why shelter animals are such soulful, sweet, creatures.

# 5. It is extremely difficult when an animal that you love gets adopted.

There are so many happy and sad tears when an animal that you have bonded and worked with at a shelter gets adopted. Seeing that animal run from your arms into the arms of their new owner is one of the most bittersweet experiences. However, we are constantly reassured that we have helped that animal to a happier life, especially when their new human sends us photos of them being goofy at their new home!

# Dog Handling Workshop with Jeff Horan!



















On 9/7, We spent a very educational morning with Jeff Horan, despite Dorian attempting to steal our focus! Jeff volunteered his time to help volunteers learn to establish a consistent approach to our dogs, and to help teach the dogs the skills they need to be successfully adopted! He discussed and modeled: 1) body language and why it is important, 2) claiming your space, 3) positive reinforcement and how to use it, 4) establishing dominance, 5) the importance of a leash, and how it can change the way you see a dog, and, 6) routine and consistency! His handling of Tyson was truly remarkable! In Jeff's hands, Tyson did not look like the dog we all know! Look for another workshop by Jeff in the near future at Hallie...it is worth your time!



# 9 Reasons Why Your Cat Keeps Meowing At You!



While cats are known by all for their precious meowing, sometimes their meow can serve as an indication that your kitty companion is trying to tell you something. Cats use their meows as a means to express their emotions, so pay attention to these specific meows to let you know just exactly what your kitty is trying to say:

## 1. To Get Your Attention, Duh!

Kittens use their meow when they are born so that their mother can hear them since they do not yet have the ability to see. As they grow older they learn to reserve their meows and usually only divvy them out when they are wanting attention. Fun fact: Cats rarely meow at one another, and use their meows more when communicating with their human!

## 2. I Want To Go Outside, Please

This one is usually a sweet meow, but loud enough to grab your attention. Whether they are by a window or perhaps the door forging an escape plan the minute it opens, this particular meowing is meant to say they want to go outdoors to go exploring.

## 3. Midnight Meowing

Cats are known to sleep roughly 16 hours a day, and as no surprise sometimes cats can become most active at night. If you happen to hear some squirrelly meows come the midnight hour, this means kitty cat is ready to play... although this might be the last thing you can think about doing while trying to catch some shut-eye.

## 4. Feed Me, Like Now

Every cat owner knows this bellowing, loudmouth meow all too well. When your cat is hungry, they are not shy about getting what they want. Until their desires are satisfied they will meow their butt off to grab your undivided attention. And if you accidentally left the store without grabbing their food, well, you better turn right back around, pronto!

## 5. Something is Really Irking Them

It doesn't matter what it is, you will know what this troubled, concerned meow means. It will signify to you that they are distressed, possibly in pain, and definitely frustrated. Rush to their aid, because this is a definite sign that they need your attention.

## 6. What's up meow

This short, cutesy meow is used as a greeting, typically heard upon seeing you on your way in the door. Your cat does this to say hello, and you may also hear this inviting meowing if they come into the room you're in and make a point to politely announce themselves. If you hear several of these sweet meows in a row, then your cat is very excited to see you. Too cute!

### 7. Long, Drawn-out Meow

A meow that's long, loud and very direct can be interpreted as having an angry cat on your hands. If they are not angry, this can be another way for them to tell you that they are in distress over something.

## 8. High-Pitched Meow, Excuse Me?!

This attention-getting meow is used by your cat to alert you quickly, which might happen if you accidentally bump into them or step on their tail. They use this high-pitched meow to signal they are in pain or something has quickly grabbed their attention. Watch out below, because kitty might get mad.

## 9. Chatterbox Meow, When Something Triggers Their Animal Instincts

These chatty meows sound like your cat is trying to entrance something with their special cat powers, and the truth is, this is exactly what they are doing. You might hear this type of meow when your cat is at a window, spotting a bird or a squirrel that excites their entrancement abilities.


### 9. Protect Them From Stranger Danger
