## Sarah Williams

Sarah is originally from CT, having worked and lived in NYC for most of her career. When she was relocated to the Raleigh area in 2010, she began volunteering at Saving Grace NC, a large dog rescue which has found homes for over 22,000 dogs since 2004!

Sarah branched out and began to work with breed specific rescue groups, hoping to work to open people's eyes to the idea that every kind of dog you might want can be found in rescue. She fostered dogs and served as the Medical Manager for Carolina Basset Hound Rescue for 5 years, and then moved on to The English Springer Spaniel Rescue.

Sarah has 5 dogs from all stages of her life. Her 12 -year-old cockapoo, Juno, came with her from CT (Sarah calls Juno her "before I knew there was a crisis" dog as there really isn't a natural population of stray dogs in New England). Sara's 11-year-old beagle mix, Woody, was her first foster from Saving Grace. #### **Microchipping and Lost Pet Prevention**

No matter how careful we are with our pets, they can still get lost. For instance, they can sneak out a door or open window or scoot under a fence in the backyard. While there is no sure way to prevent your pet from getting lost, you can help make sure they are returned home with a microchip.

If you're not sure if your pet was microchipped by a previous owner, you can ask your <u>veterinarian</u> to check for one at your next visit. You should also contact the microchip registration service and update it with your information. What is a microchip?

#### What is a microchip?

A microchip is a small device implanted under your pet's skin. It emits a low radio frequency that can be read by a scanner to show a unique identification code. Most veterinarians and shelters have a universal scanner, which can read any kind of microchip. The code can be called into the registration service associated with the microchip and used to look up the pet parent's contact information. The service can then call the pet parent to let them know the pet has been recovered and help arrange for a

#### HOW A PET MICROCHIP WORKS

Veterinarians can implant these tiny devices in all kinds of pets – including cats, dogs, birds and reptiles. Each chip carries a unique number that is linked in an online database to the name and contact information of the pet's owner.

#### KEY PARTS

1. Microchip holds the unique ID number.

2. Tuning capacitor receives power from an external scanner and sends it to the microchip.

3. Copper antenna coil then transmits microchip's information to scanner.

4. Biocompatible glass capsule – nontoxic and designed to prevent allergic reactions – surrounds components.

#### REGISTRATION

The pet and its owner are enrolled in a database, either by mail or on the Internet. But owners must keep their contact information up to date for the system to work properly. DETECTION The chip has no battery. It is energized by the radio waves of handheld scanners used by animal shelters and veterinarians.



## How To Keep Your Dog Safe From Coyotes!



## Pet parents beware: Coyote attacks can – and do – happen.

Okay, I know what you're thinking: "Coyotes?" "There are no coyotes near me!" But, gone are the days of coyotes only roaming the prairies and forests of the west. Today, coyotes call every state in the United States (except Hawaii) home. They can be found everywhere from coast to coast, in rural, suburban, and urban settings. So, you could meet up with one on a walk, hike, at the park, or even in your own backyard!

Why? Humans! Human land expansion and development have taken over so much of the wide-open natural landscape which has ultimately forced coyotes *(and other wildlife)* to move on. Additionally, human hunting habits have thinned out populations of the coyotes' natural predators, like the wolf.

#### About Coyotes

Get this: Coyotes are a member of the dog family. So, as you may imagine, they're very attracted to our pet dogs. Likewise, our dogs are attracted to them. They can even mate! But, it's important we keep our pups far away to avoid attacks. Coyotes are skilled hunters who are resourceful and masters at adapting. They can stalk and subsequently snatch their prey in a flash. They've even been known to grab dogs right from their leash on a walk. They're not afraid of your dog, but *they are* cautious of humans. So, keep Fido close.

Some quick facts about coyotes:

Coyotes look similar to a German Shepherd, but they have narrow snouts, long triangular ears, yellow eyes, long course grayish-brown or yellowish-brown fur on their upper body with whitish fur underneath, and a long bushy pointy tail (usually with a black tip).

If you're ever not sure who is running – dog or coyote – check out his tail. Dogs run with their tails up and coyotes run with theirs down.

Their height reaches 24" to the shoulder, and they weigh in at 20-50 pounds. Eastern coyotes are known to be larger.

Their formal name is Canis latrans.

They are omnivores. Although coyotes prefer to eat smaller animals *(like rats, raccoons, rabbits, and squirrels)*, when those choices aren't available, they will eat fruits, seeds, and plants ... or whatever they can scavenge.

Lifespan in the wild is 10-14 years, but in captivity can be up to 20 years.






## **Wonton**




#### **Chevy**






