It is hard to believe that I have been the director at Hallie Hill for 10 years now. When I came on staff in June of 2012, I really had no idea what was in store for me or the sanctuary. My time here has been amazing and every day I consider myself fortunate to be a part of this incredible organization. While I still get to spend time with day to day operations and animal care, much of my time is currently spent on administrative tasks and helping promote the sanctuary. Like so many people, I get caught up in day to day business and can't see the forest for the trees. Sometimes, an animal reminds me of the true mission of Hallie Hill and it makes me feel proud to be a part of such an amazing place. A new little hound named Freda did just that.

I met Freda at Colleton County Animal Care when I was there to pick up two other dogs. I was asked to consider accepting her at the sanctuary, since she had a poor chance of being adopted. Let me take this opportunity to say that the staff at the Colleton shelter are some of the most amazing people I know and have always been a pleasure to work with! They explained it took a long time to catch this skinny little hound with hair loss and missing part of her front left paw. They were able to get her to the safety of the shelter and start her on a road to recovery. Sadly, Freda was probably never a house dog, and is very timid with people. She has heartworms and other internal parasites. It is obvious she has had multiple litters of puppies and probably inadequate nutrition in her 5 years of life. Her physical challenges won't be as large a hurdle to cross as her lack of social skills. Life must have been hard for this sweet little hound who takes a submissive pose as people approach, but Hallie Hill will make sure her days of suffering are over. We will provide all of the medical support she needs and the time crucial to finding her a wonderful home. If it is determined that Freda will not thrive in a home, she will be a welcome addition as a long term resident at the sanctuary.





It's that Time of Year Again! Be PROACTIVE and PROTECT your pet!

MORE PETS GO MISSING ON THE 4TH OF JULY THAN ANY OTHER DAY OF THE YEAR!

Share these 9 easy tips to create a safe and dog-friendly Independence Day



Give your dog plenty of exercise during the day and be sure to let them out to potty before sundown when the noise begins.

Make sure your dog is wearing a proper fitting collar with current ID tag and is microchipped in the event the collar comes off. Dogs are expert escape artists around the 4th of July, which makes a GPS collar another great option to ensure your pup returns home safely.

Keep your dog indoors during fireworks with windows secured and curtains closed. Removing visual stimulation will help keep your pup calm.

Be there for your dog. Contrary to popular belief, you can't reinforce their anxiety by comforting your dog. If you remain confident and calm, your dog will pick up on your energy and likely feel the same.

Ensure your dog remains in a safe, enclosed area where they cannot hurt themselves if panicked. Dogs often prefer small den-like areas (under the bed or in a crate) when scared.

Drown out the noise from the booms outside by turning up the TV, running the dishwasher, doing a load of laundry, turning on a fan, playing music and/or using a white noise machine.

Offer your pup something tasty to focus on during the fireworks like cooked chicken, special dog treats or popcorn. Delicious food can actually help change a dog's emotional state and behavior. Try creative recipes for frozen pupsicles or a stuffed Kong toy to give your dog hours of fun.

Talk to your veterinarian about anxiety meds, pheromones like Adaptil, aromatherapy oils, anxiety wraps or Thundershirts, if your dog tends to get extremely anxious.

Avoid using fireworks around your dog so they aren't accidentally burned. And resist bringing them with you to the festivities. Most dogs just don't enjoy loud noises and large crowds and they'll easily get spooked and run away.

How to Help a Fearful Cat in a New Home

How can I tell if my cat is fearful?

A cat's behavior can tell you a lot about their emotions. In general, a cat who feels happy and safe will spend time out in the open. They will walk with their tail up and ears forward or slightly to the side. They will explore and interact with their environment in a confident manner. When in a new place, even a confident cat may hide. In contrast, a cat who is feeling fearful may exhibit any of the following behaviors:

cowering or walking with their body low to the ground, fleeing in response to noises or when approached, hissing, swatting, or trying to bite if handled, decreased appetite* urinating or defecating outside of the litterbox* appearing "shut down" or pretending to be asleep*

**Lack of appetite, inappropriate elimination, lethargy, or any sudden change in a cat's behavior could also be an indication of an underlying medical condition. If you notice any of these, contact your veterinarian right away.*

INDEPENDENT PLAY

Opportunities to play alone help to prevent boredom and oversleeping when a cat's human is away. Catnip toys hanging from the cat tree or a door knob and electronic motion activated toys will do the trick! A slow feeder can keep a cat busy as he eats his meal and improve his digestion at the same time.

PREY TYPES

A cat's prey preference is his play preference. Some cats prefer feathered toys that "fly" above them, some like furballs that scurry down the halls, and some like small toys with unpredictable movements. Learning his preference early on will save money on toys that may not get used.

INTERACTIVE PLAY

Playing together strengthens the human-cat bond and, if done on a regular basis, is a very effective weight management tool! Wands and teasers can get a cat running and jumping. Before feeding time, kibbles from his meal can be thrown for him to chase after or even catch mid-air if he's quick enough!

MENTAL STIMULATION

Food and security are a sure thing for cats living comfortably indoors. It's important to keep their minds as active as their bodies. Hiding kibble around a room can activate the instinct to hunt and clicker training is a fun way for a cat to learn new things. You may learn something, too!





BE AWARE! EXCESSIVE HEAT CAN BE DEADLY!

It's Hot Out!

Don't Leave Your Pet in the Car!

A car can overheat **even** when the window has been left cracked an inch or two.

Young, overweight or elderly animals, or those with short muzzles or thick or dark-colored coats are most at risk for overheating.

Shady spots offer **little** protection on hot days, and move with the sun.

90° **102°** **120°**

Even if the temperature outside is only 70°, the inside of your car may be as much as 20 degrees hotter!

On an 85° day, it only takes ten minutes for the inside of your car to reach 102°.

Within just 30 minutes, the car's interior can climb from 85° to a scorching 120°.

Many states and local governments have laws that prohibit leaving an animal unattended in a motor vehicle under dangerous conditions, which includes hot days. Your car could be damaged or you could be charged with a crime.

ASPCA

If you see an animal trapped in a car on a hot day, try to locate the owner or call 911. Stay by the car until assistance arrives.

6 SIGNS OF HEAT STROKE IN DOGS

- RAPID PANTING
- WEAKNESS
- BRIGHT RED TONGUE
- DIARRHEA
- VOMITING
- THICK/STICKY SALIVA

WHAT TO DO:

1. Move dog into a cool area
2. Apply cool water all over body
3. Apply cool towels to head, neck and chest
4. Give small drinks of cool water
5. Take your dog to the vet ASAP

DOGS DIE IN HOT CARS

We know how the heat of hot cars can get in the summer, but it's even worse for our canine companions. There's only one way to keep your dog safe in the car.

THE EFFECTS OF HEAT ON DOGS

Dogs aren't great at regulating their body temperature. Unlike us humans, they can only sweat through their paws, and so the inside of your car can get so hot so fast.

PAWS **PANTING**

If they can't cool down fast enough, in just a few minutes they can develop heatstroke.

EFFECTS OF HEAT INCLUDE:

- Heart Problems
- Organ Failure
- Seizures
- Brain Damage
- Coma

A DOG CAN DIE IN LESS THAN 15 MINUTES OF BEING LEFT IN A HOT CAR.

Find an alternative:

- Use a drive-thru.
- Bring a friend who can play with your dog while you run an errand.
- Shop at pet-friendly stores.
- Eat at an outdoor cafe where your dog can sit with you.
- Leave your dog at home where it's cool and safe.

15 MINUTES

After performing autopsies of dogs that have died in hot cars, vets have described their organs as "soggy".

HOW HOT DOES A CAR GET?

29°C **51°C**

An outside temperature of 29°C reaches 51°C in only 30 minutes.

40° is the average temperature of the Sahara Desert & Death Valley!

Leaving a window open or cracking the door makes NO DIFFERENCE. Your dog will still cook up to dangerous levels.

KNOW THE WARNING SIGNS OF HEATSTROKE

- ✓ Heavy Panting
- ✓ Excessive Drooling
- ✓ Collapsed
- ✓ Lethargy
- ✓ Lack of coordination
- ✓ Vomiting

IF YOU SEE A DOG TRAPPED IN A CAR

- Record information about the vehicle (make, model, color & registration no.)
- Find the owner nearby, alert public
- Call the police on **999**
- Stay with the dog until help arrives

SHOULD YOU BREAK INTO THE CAR?

It may be tempting to break into the car to save the dog. However it could be classed as criminal damage, unless the owner agrees it was necessary to do so under the circumstances.

Before considering breaking in, call the police, tell them of your intentions and get photo/video evidence of the dog in danger.

HOW TO GIVE FIRST AID TO DOGS

- Move dog to a shaded/cool area
- Pour small amounts of room temperature water on to the dog's body if the water is cold the dog could go into shock
- If possible, use wet towels or a fan to cool the dog down
- Allow the dog to drink small amounts of cool water - do not pour the water in the dog's mouth

Take the dog to a vet as soon as possible, even if it appears to have returned to normal.



Your Guide to Preparing for Tick Season



As the weather gets warmer, ticks become more active. These parasites can transmit many diseases through their bite, so it's important to keep your pets safe with these helpful tips!

Regularly check your pet for ticks when they come inside from outdoors

Ticks are often the size of a pinhead before they bite

Ticks prefer to attach close to the head, neck, ears and feet but can be found anywhere on your pet's body

Use flea-prevention products recommended by your veterinarian

Regularly mow your lawn and remove tall weeds

Watch out for tall brush or grass




If you do find a tick on your pet, call your veterinarian. It is vital to take proper care when removing ticks to prevent transmitting infection to yourself or your pet

Watch Out for Blue Green Algae!

It's summer and warm weather conditions promote the growth of **cyanobacteria** that can make your pet seriously sick! Here's what to watch out for if your pet will be around bodies of water this season.

If your pet is exposed to blue green algae signs may develop in as little as a few minutes or may take up to 12 hours to arise. Your pet may present with signs such as drooling, disorientation, weakness, vomiting, panting, collapse, seizures, respiratory failure and even death.
